

These new desktop tools serve as the starting point for nearly all your Windows tasks. appears in the Taskbar. By default, the Taskbar is constantly visible at the bottom of the screen, simplifying multitasking by providing point-and-click access to any running program.

My Computer

When you want a quick way to access certain system components, you can double-click the My Computer icon. The My Computer window provides double-click access to your system's drives, fonts, and printers, as well as the Windows Control Panel.

Network Neighborhood

Double-clicking the Network Neighborhood icon gives you easy access to shared network resources. The Network Neighborhood window shows you what computers are in your immediate workgroup and offers a view of the entire network.

Recycle Bin

Just as a home recycle bin lets you save items someone might want to reuse, the Windows 95 Recycle Bin saves files and directories in case you need to recover them. You can safely and easily delete items by clicking and dragging them to the Recycle Bin—and you can just as easily undelete items by dragging them out of the Recycle Bin.
